Our current price is \$4.75. We are still the lowest in the state, only matched by the City of Midland-Barstow Airport. The Fuel System has been upgraded! It has a new dispenser, longer hose and grounding reel as well as updated QtPod components.



Sparling also installed an Interstitial Indicator device which will detect any leaking of the inner tank to the outer tank. This is very important since this is a 25-year-old tank. They will return in the fall for their annual inspections and filter changes.



Henry's Tree Service completed the cutting/topping on Dave Maxwell's and Sam Kruskamp's properties. 4 trees were cut and 3 were topped.



Mead & Hunt completed the 90% meeting with the FAA, MDOT Aeronautics and us which outlined many of the steps of the runway rehabilitation project, responsibilities, and timeline. We completed the Independent Fee Estimate for the Construction Administration contract, thanks to Bill Brickner, the manager at the Mount Pleasant Airport. His support and assistance are immeasurable!

We are in the first stages of planning for another cull of the remaining 21 tags. The 12 airport neighbors who contacted me received the packaged venison from the first cull and were very appreciative.

All hangars are rented with one coming open at the end of February.

- Worked on a roof leak at City Hall

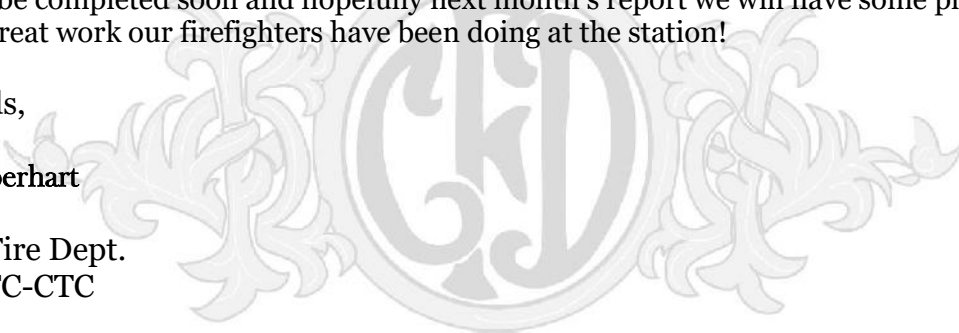


Monthly Fire Department Activity Report January 2026 Incident Responses: 28 Year to Date Total:30

January continued to be a busy month for the Clare Fire Department. Throughout the month crews responded to a gambit of calls. Of note on the 18th the CFD responded to southbound 127 at the 160 exit into Clare. A vehicle traveling northbound crossed the median striking another head on. Unfortunately, both drivers lost their lives on impact but a 16-year-old passenger was extricated by fire personnel from the southbound vehicle and transported to Midland for further treatment with critical injuries. Along with other multiple accidents in the month crews also handled two structure fires in the month as well. A pole barn was a total loss at 11928 S. Brand Avenue on the 24th. On the 29th crews were called to 8929 Otter Drive for a fire in the bedroom. On arrival crews were met with heavy smoke coming from the residence but aggressive interior attack helped contain the fire to the back bedroom of the home, limiting damage to the rest of the structure. Training for the month included our required blood borne pathogen training along with Ice Rescue training and RTF training with Homeland Security for mass casualty incidents as well as our regular apparatus checks. Along with the gambit of calls and training for the month personnel have also been diligently working on painting and updating the lobby, office and kitchen areas of the station which was long overdue. The project should be completed soon and hopefully next month's report we will have some pictures to share of the great work our firefighters have been doing at the station!

Continued, Current and Upcoming Programs and Event

Senior Cards and Coffee takes place on Thursday mornings at the Pere Marquette District Library from 10-12 p.m. in one of the small group rooms. The card games that are played are determined by what the group wants to play and the group is supplied with coffee and card decks.

50th Annual Clare Irish Festival – March 11-14, 2026

The **Irish Pet Photo Contest** has started and we are accepting submissions. People are able to submit their Irish-themed pet photos from now until Wednesday, March 11, 2026 at 3:00 p.m. Winning photos will receive Clare Cash (1st Place \$50; 2nd Place \$25; 3rd Place \$10). Winners will be announced on Clare Parks and Recreation's Facebook page at 6 p.m. on Saturday, March 14, 2026. Judging is completed by the members of the Spay-Neuter Animal Project.

The **Leprechaun Trap Contest** is taking place once again. People of all ages are encouraged to drop off their specially designed leprechaun traps to the Pere Marquette District Library February 16 - March 17th. Voting will take place March 18-31st and trap with the highest votes will win a prize.

We will be once again hosting our annual tea party event at the Pere Marquette District Library. The **Once Upon a Tea – Tea Party** will take place on Saturday, March 21st at 3:00 p.m. There will be tea, hors d'oeuvres by the Dairy Phil, wand, crown, and potion making! It will be fun for all ages!!! Elaine's Hair and Nails will be joining us for a pamper activity during the event as well. Space is limited and ticket admission is required. Ticket cost is \$15 each or 2/\$25.

The **Great EGGstravaganza** will be taking place on Saturday, April 4th. The annual egg drop event at the Clare Municipal Airport will take place between 9 a.m. – 11:30 a.m. will three timed drops for the various age groups. Additional Information/Reminders

- MSU Extension has continued their invasive species study of McIreland Trail. The findings report is in the parks and recreation folder in the department head report folder.
- Simmer has continued to work with local artist Jeff Best and the Clare County Arts Council to try and get an art sculpture placed at the south end of town. Simmer has received the grant funds from the Clare County Community Foundation for the public art grant that was wrote for this specific project. Best has the sculpture completed and now Simmer is just waiting for the approval from MDOT for placement in or around the area of the south end round-a-bout. The permit application and information packet (recommendation letters and request letter and information) has been submitted.
- At the end of December, a grant was submitted to the MPARKS foundation for their “Play is Essential” grant. The grant request was for a couple of inclusion swings. We should be notified by the conference date on whether we were a grant recipient.
- Clare Parks and Recreation has updated the Youth Police Academy flyer for the police department.
- A. Santini has been hosting his annual Euchre tournament on Sunday afternoons at Four Leaf Brewing and will run until February 22, 2026. Proceeds go to the Emerald Isle Recreation Complex project fund.
- Clare Parks and Recreation is currently assisting with the Christmas decoration contract that is up for renewal, working on securing people and activities for the 2026 Christmas Fest and is working with the CTE program to see about getting a new Santa house as the current one is in disrepair.
- Our annual Little League meeting to go over the agreement renewal with the organization is schedule for February 17, 2026.

Ongoing

- The next Clare Union Depot Governing Board Committee meeting will be held in March. At the last meeting the governing board agreed on changing the schedule to accommodate our more active months – March, June, September, and November.
- Simmer was selected by MPARKS selection committee to be one of the conference committee members for the conference in Lansing in March 2026. This will require Simmer to attend periodic zoom meetings and a couple of on-site meetings in Lansing. Simmer will be gone at conference March 2-6th.

- Clare Parks and Recreation is represented by Simmer on the Friends of Clare County Parks and Recreation Board where Simmer has served as the board secretary since July 2015. There is a monthly meeting for the board and takes place the 4th Tuesday of each month.
- Clare Parks and Recreation is continuing to be a part of the Knuckles Knorth group. This regional group focuses on parks and recreation opportunities for Central Michigan → North.
- Clare Parks and Recreation is a part of the MSU Extension – District 6 Advisory Council. This is a committee of outdoor recreation, agriculture, community leaders in the district to join together for the area. Dear Ms. Simmer,

I am a Research Technician working on the Exotic Forest Pest Research project with Dr. Deborah McCullough's Forest Entomology lab at Michigan State University. As you may remember, a major goal of this statewide project is to facilitate early detection of non-native woodboring insect species that could be a problem if they arrive and become established in Michigan. We also gain considerable information about the diversity and distribution of native woodborers. Many of these species play valuable roles in decomposition and nutrient cycling, helping to maintain healthy, productive forests.

I am writing to thank you for your cooperation with our 2025 efforts. In 2025, we set up and monitored an array of traps at 30 sites across Michigan. Most of these trapping sites are in or near locations where solid wood packing material (e.g., crating, pallets), along with imported nursery stock or firewood poses a risk of introducing non-native forest insects. We collected and identified a total of 3,359 longhorned beetles, metallic woodboring beetles, and horntails, representing 113 different species. We are happy to report that we did not capture any of the non-native forest pests targeted by our study at Stamina Stadium.

Wastewater Treatment Plant

In addition to their routine duties, our Operators performed the following tasks:

- Cleaned up the brush and chipped branches from the ice storm last week.
- Cummings was here to start yearly generator maintenance.
- Transformer for the non-potable replaced
- Insulated pipes in the clarifier room
- Put expanded metal over the drains in the drying beds.
- UV compressor maintenance
- Thawed the raw sampler pick up line
- Fixed the oiler for the lower bearing of the screw line that broke from the reservoir to the distribution block.
- Installed and wired the non-potable pump
- Replaced the GFI at lift station 6. The APC is back in and working.
- Installed the new non-potable booster pump. Replaced the coil in the starter now it is working.
- Repaired lift station 3 communication error
- Repaired a busted water line in the ferric storage room.
- The polymer pump is back online

- Replaced the screen on the discharge pipe at well 6

Happy New Year! I hope everyone had a safe and enjoyable holiday season as we move into another year serving the City of Clare.

January was a busy month behind the scenes as we worked through a large number of required year-end reports for both state and federal agencies. These reports are time-consuming but necessary to maintain compliance and ensure we remain eligible for future funding opportunities.

Winter weather kept our officers active throughout the month. Snow and icy conditions contributed to an increase in traffic accidents, and an increased amount of time assisting motorists.

Our newest full-time officer, Jimmy Chinavare, has begun his Field Training program and will be working alongside a training officer for approximately the next 16 weeks. This structured process is designed to prepare him for solo patrol while reinforcing department expectations and procedures. We are encouraged by his early progress and are pleased to have him on the team.

At the same time, we currently have a full-time officer on medical leave, which has temporarily added to the shortage of staffing levels. Even while short staffed, the department continues to provide uninterrupted 24/7 police coverage. I want to recognize my officers for their flexibility and commitment to ensuring service levels remain strong for our residents.

There were no major incidents or large community events during January. Patrol operations were steady, and officers remained proactive while continuing their day-to-day engagement with the public. Training and preparedness remain a priority as we move into the new year, and we will continue to evaluate staffing, equipment, and operational needs to best support the community.

Overall, the department is off to a solid start in 2026. We remain committed to providing professional, reliable service and appreciate the continued support of the City Commission.

Observations & Highlights

- **Property Checks (107)** and **Traffic Stops (84)** represent the highest volume of activity, reflecting proactive policing efforts.
 - **General Assistance calls (34)** and **Ambulance Runs (26)** demonstrate continued community support and emergency response responsibilities.
 - Traffic-related incidents, including accidents and enforcement actions, remain a significant portion of department activity.
 - The department investigated **2 CSC 1 cases, 12 intimidation/stalking complaints, and 4 suicides**, highlighting ongoing needs for victim services and mental health response coordination.
 - One **fatal traffic accident** was reported during the month.

Conclusion

January 2026 was an active month for the Clare City Police Department, with a balanced distribution between proactive enforcement, emergency response, criminal investigations, and community assistance. Traffic enforcement and property checks remain key operational priorities, while the department continues to respond to a diverse range of criminal and public safety incidents.
